

Solutions Exercices ARMA.

Drapes:

①. Le modèle MA(q)

$$Y_t = \theta_0 + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-2} - \cdots - \theta_q \varepsilon_{t-q}$$

où ε_t sont iid $N(0, \sigma^2_\varepsilon)$

$$\Rightarrow MA(1): Y_t = \theta_0 + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

$$\Rightarrow MA(2): Y_t = \theta_0 + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-2}$$

Y_t	MA(1)	MA(2)
$E[Y_t]$	θ_0	θ_0
$Var[Y_t] = \gamma_0$	$\sigma^2_\varepsilon (1 + \theta_1^2)$	$\sigma^2_\varepsilon (1 + \theta_1^2 + \theta_2^2)$
$Cov(Y_t, Y_{t-k}) = \gamma_k$	$\begin{cases} 0 & \text{si } k \geq 1 \\ -\theta_1 \sigma^2_\varepsilon & \text{si } k=1 \end{cases}$	$\begin{cases} 0 & \text{si } k > 2 \\ -\theta_2 \sigma^2_\varepsilon & \text{si } k=2 \\ (-\theta_1 + \theta_1 \theta_2) \sigma^2_\varepsilon & \text{si } k=1 \end{cases}$
$\rho_k = \text{Corr}(Y_t, Y_{t-k})$	$\begin{cases} 1 & \text{si } k=0 \\ \frac{-\theta_1}{1+\theta_1^2} & \text{si } k=1 \\ 0 & \text{si } k > 1 \end{cases}$	$\begin{cases} 1 & \text{si } k=0 \\ \frac{-\theta_1 + \theta_1 \theta_2}{1+\theta_1^2+\theta_2^2} & \text{si } k=1 \\ \frac{-\theta_2}{1+\theta_1^2+\theta_2^2} & \text{si } k=2 \\ 0 & \text{si } k > 2 \end{cases}$

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②. Modèle AR(p)

$$Y_t = \phi_1 Y_{t-1} + \phi_2 Y_{t-2} + \dots + \phi_p Y_{t-p} + \phi_0 + \varepsilon_t$$

$$\varepsilon_t \sim \text{iid } N(0, \sigma^2_\varepsilon) \quad \text{et}$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{AR}(1) : \quad Y_t = \phi_1 Y_{t-1} + \phi_0 + \varepsilon_t$$

$$\Rightarrow \text{AR}(2) : \quad Y_t = \phi_1 Y_{t-1} + \phi_2 Y_{t-2} + \phi_0 + \varepsilon_t$$

Y_t	$\overbrace{\text{AR}(1)}$	$\overbrace{\text{AR}(2)}$
Condition stationnarité	$ \phi_1 < 1$	$ \phi_1 + \phi_2 < 1$ et $ \phi_2 < 1$
$E[Y_t]$	$\frac{\phi_0}{1 - \phi_1}$	$\frac{\phi_0}{1 - \phi_1 - \phi_2}$
$\text{Var}[Y_t] = \gamma_0$	$\frac{\sigma^2_\varepsilon}{1 - \phi_1^2}$	$\frac{(1 - \phi_2)^2 \sigma^2_\varepsilon}{(1 + \phi_2)[(1 - \phi_1)^2 - \phi_1^2]}$
$\gamma_k = \text{Cov}(Y_{t+1}, Y_{t+k})$	$\phi_1^k \gamma_0 = \phi_1 \gamma_{k-1}$	$\begin{cases} \frac{\phi_1 \gamma_0}{1 - \phi_2} & \text{si } k=1 \\ \left(\frac{\phi_1^2}{1 - \phi_2} + \phi_2\right) \gamma_0 & \text{si } k=2 \\ \phi_1 \gamma_{k-1} + \phi_2 \gamma_{k-2} & \text{si } k \geq 2 \end{cases}$
Condition stationnarité	$\phi_1^k = \phi_1 \phi_{k-1}$	$\hat{\phi}_1 = \frac{(1 - \hat{\rho}_2) \hat{\rho}_1}{1 - \hat{\rho}_1^2}$ $\hat{\phi}_2 = \frac{\hat{\rho}_2 - \hat{\rho}_1^2}{1 - \hat{\rho}_1^2}$
$\rho_k = \text{Corr}(Y_t, Y_{t+k})$	Yule Walker	$\begin{cases} 1 & \text{si } k=0 \\ \frac{\phi_1}{1 - \phi_2} & \text{si } k=1 \\ \frac{\phi_1^2}{1 - \phi_2} + \phi_2 & \text{si } k=2 \\ \phi_1 \rho_{k-1} + \phi_2 \rho_{k-2} & \text{si } k \geq 2 \end{cases}$

③. Modèle ARMA(p,q)

$$Y_t = \phi_1 Y_{t-1} + \phi_2 Y_{t-2} + \dots + \phi_p Y_{t-p} + \theta_0 + \theta_1 \varepsilon_t + \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-1} + \dots + \theta_q \varepsilon_{t-q}$$

$$\text{ARMA}(1,1) : Y_t = \phi_1 Y_{t-1} + \theta_0 + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

Condition stationnarité:

$$\mathbb{E}[Y_t]$$

$$|\phi_1| < 1$$

$$\frac{\theta_0}{1-\phi_1}$$

$$\text{Var}[Y_t]$$

$$\frac{(1+\theta_1^2 - 2\phi_1\theta_1)\sigma_\varepsilon^2}{1-\phi_1^2}$$

$$\text{Corr}[Y_t, Y_{t-k}] = \rho_k$$

$$\begin{cases} \frac{(\phi_1 - \theta_1)(1 - \phi_1\theta_1)}{1 - \phi_1^2} \sigma_\varepsilon^2 & \text{si } k=1 \\ \phi_1 \rho_{k-1} & \text{si } k \geq 2 \end{cases}$$

$$\text{Corr}(Y_t, Y_{t-k}) = \rho_k$$

$$\begin{cases} 1 & \text{si } k=0 \\ \frac{(\phi_1 - \theta_1)(1 - \phi_1\theta_1)}{(1 + \theta_1^2 - 2\theta_1\phi_1)} & \text{si } k=1 \\ \phi_1 \rho_{k-1} & \text{si } k \geq 2 \end{cases}$$

a). $\varepsilon_0 = \varepsilon_1 = \dots = 0$

b). $\hat{\varepsilon}_t = y_t - \theta_0 + \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} + \dots + \theta_q \varepsilon_{t-q}$

c). $\hat{y}_{T+h} = \mathbb{E} [y_{T+h} | y_1, \dots, y_T]$

⇒ Model AR (P)

a). $y_0 = y_1 = \dots = \frac{\phi_0}{1 - \phi_1 - \phi_2 - \dots - \phi_p}$

b). estimation per Yule-Walker als prozedur.

c). $\hat{y}_{T+h} = \mathbb{E} [y_{T+h} | y_1, \dots, y_T]$

⇒ ARMA (p, q)

a). $y_0 = y_1 = \dots = \frac{\phi_0}{1 - \phi_1 - \phi_2 - \dots - \phi_p} = \theta_0$

b). $\varepsilon_0 = \varepsilon_1 = \dots = 0$

c). $\hat{\varepsilon}_t = y_t - \phi_1 y_{t-1} - \dots - \phi_p y_{t-p} - \theta_0 + \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} + \dots + \theta_q \varepsilon_{t-q}$

d). $\hat{y}_{T+h} = \mathbb{E} [y_{T+h} | y_1, \dots, y_T]$

A1

- Processus MA

Par définition, ~~verif~~ si $X_t \sim MA(1)$ on écrit :

$$X_t = \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

⇒ Fonction d'autocovariance : $\gamma_X(k)$ est :

$$\begin{aligned} \gamma_X(k) &= \text{Cov}(X_t, X_{t+k}) = \text{Cov}(\varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}, \varepsilon_{t+k} - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}) \\ &= \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_t \cdot \varepsilon_{t+k} - \theta_1 \varepsilon_t \varepsilon_{t+k-1} - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} \varepsilon_{t+k} + \theta_1^2 \varepsilon_{t-1} \varepsilon_{t+k-1}] \\ &= \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_t \varepsilon_{t+k}] - \theta_1 \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_t \varepsilon_{t+k-1}] - \theta_1 \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_{t-1} \varepsilon_{t+k}] \\ &\quad + \theta_1^2 \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_{t-1} \varepsilon_{t+k-1}] \end{aligned}$$

$$\Rightarrow \gamma_X(k) = \begin{cases} \sigma_\varepsilon^2 + \theta_1^2 \sigma_\varepsilon^2 = (1 + \theta_1^2) \sigma_\varepsilon^2 & \text{si } k=0 \\ -\theta_1 \sigma_\varepsilon^2 & \text{si } |k|=1 \\ 0 & \text{si } k>1 \end{cases}$$

⇒ Fonction d'auto-corrélation est donc :

$$P_X(k) = \frac{\gamma_X(k)}{\gamma_X(0)} = \begin{cases} 1 & \text{si } k=0 \\ -\frac{\theta_1 \sigma_\varepsilon^2}{\sigma_\varepsilon^2 (1 + \theta_1^2)} = -\frac{\theta_1}{1 + \theta_1^2} & \text{si } |k|=1 \\ 0 & \text{si } k>1 \end{cases}$$

MA ~ un processus stationnaire, par définition

(5)

En faisant varier θ_1 , sur $] -1, 1 [$ on a :

$$k=1, \theta_1 = 0 \Rightarrow \rho_X(1) = 0$$

$$\theta_1 = \frac{1}{2} \Rightarrow \rho_X(1) = \frac{-\frac{1}{2}}{1+\frac{1}{4}} = -0,4$$

$$\theta_1 = -\frac{1}{2} \Rightarrow \rho_X(1) = \frac{\frac{1}{2}}{1+\frac{1}{4}} = 0,4$$

$$\theta_1 = 1 \Rightarrow \rho_X(1) = -\frac{1}{2}$$

$$\theta_1 = -1 \Rightarrow \rho_X(1) = \frac{1}{2}$$

La corrélation maximale est donc à ~~0~~ $\neq 0$.

A2

On utilise un MA(1), soit $X_t \sim \text{MA}(1)$

On dispose de la valeur de ~~la~~ $\rho_X(1)$ l'autocorrelation d'ordre 1 de la série X_t :

$$\rho_X(1) = 0,4$$

\Rightarrow Calculons θ_1

Par définition, un MA(1) s'écrit :

$$X_t = \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

$$\Rightarrow \rho_X(1) = \frac{-\theta_1}{1+\theta_1^2} = 0,4$$

$$\text{il vient } -\theta_1 = 0,4 + 0,4 \theta_1^2 \quad -2,5 + 1,5 \quad \frac{2,5 + 1,5}{2} \approx -0,5$$

\Rightarrow Équation du second degré

$$\text{Solutions: } \theta_1 = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a} = \begin{cases} \frac{-2,5 - 1,5}{2} = -2 \\ \frac{-2,5 + 1,5}{2} = 0 \end{cases}$$

\Rightarrow la réponse est $\theta_1 = -0,5$, prouvé!

$$\text{Var}(X_t) = \sigma_{\varepsilon}^2 (1 + \theta_1^2) \quad (\text{MA(1)})$$

Pour $\theta_1 = -0,5$

$$\text{on a } \text{Var}(X_t) = \sigma_{\varepsilon}^2 \cdot 1,25$$

Pour $\theta_1 = -2$,

$$\text{Var}(X_t) = \sigma_{\varepsilon}^2 (1 + 4) = 5 \sigma_{\varepsilon}^2.$$

Avec $\sigma_{\varepsilon}^2 = \text{fixe} = \text{constante}$,

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Var}(X_t) &< \text{Var}(X_t) \\ \text{avec } \theta_1 = -0,5 &\quad \text{avec } \theta_1 = -2. \end{aligned}$$

On choisit la valeur de θ_1 qui donne une variance minimale.

- Modèle MA(1)

$$Y_t = \mu + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}, \quad t=1, \dots, N$$

où $\mu = \theta_0$ (de la définition)

On dispose: $\mu = 1$, $\theta_1 = -0,5$ et $Y_N = 8$

\Rightarrow Déterminons \hat{Y}_{N+1} : prévision à l'horizon $h=1$

$$\begin{aligned} \hat{Y}_{N+1} &= \hat{Y}_N(1) = \mathbb{E}[Y_{N+1} | Y_1, \dots, Y_N] \\ &= \mathbb{E}[\mu + \varepsilon_{N+1} - \theta_1 \varepsilon_N | Y_1, \dots, Y_N] \\ &= \mathbb{E}[\mu | Y_1, \dots, Y_N] + \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_{N+1} | Y_1, \dots, Y_N] \\ &\quad - \theta_1 \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_N | Y_1, \dots, Y_N] \end{aligned}$$

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$$\Rightarrow \hat{Y}_{N+1} = Y_{N+1} = \mathbb{E}[Y_{N+1} | Y_1, \dots, Y_N]$$

$$= \mu + \sigma - \theta_1 \mathbb{E}[\varepsilon_N | Y_1, \dots, Y_N]$$

A7

$$\text{MAC(1)}: Y_t = \mu + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

- Calculous $\mathbb{E}\{\varepsilon_t(\varepsilon_t - \mu)(\varepsilon_{t-1} - \mu)\}$

$$\mathbb{E}\{\varepsilon_t(\varepsilon_t - \mu)(\varepsilon_{t-1} - \mu)\} = \mathbb{E}\{\varepsilon_t \cdot \varepsilon_{t-1}\} - \theta_1 \mathbb{E}\{\varepsilon_t \varepsilon_{t-2}\}$$

$$- \theta_1 \mathbb{E}\{\varepsilon_{t-1}^2\} + \theta_1^2 \mathbb{E}\{\varepsilon_{t-1} \cdot \varepsilon_{t-2}\}$$

$$\gamma_y^{(1)} = -\theta_1 \frac{\theta_1^2}{1-\theta_1^2} \neq -\theta_1$$

$$\text{MAC(1)}, \quad Y_t = \mu + \varepsilon_t - \phi \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

$$\rho_Y(k) = 0, \quad \text{if } |k| > 1$$

- c'est vrai. Puisque :

$$\rho_Y(k) = \begin{cases} 1 & \text{if } k=0 \\ -\frac{\phi}{1+\phi^2} & \text{if } k=1 \\ 0 & \text{if } k \geq 1 \end{cases}$$

- Par définition -

$$- \text{MA}(2), Y_t = \mu + \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-2}$$

$$\approx \mu = 0, \theta_1 = 0.2, \theta_2 = 0.4$$

Calculus $P_Y(2)$

$$\gamma_Y(2) = \text{Cov}(Y_t, Y_{t+2}) = \mathbb{E} [(\varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-2}) \times (\varepsilon_{t+2} - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t+1} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t+2-2})]$$

$$= \mathbb{E} [\varepsilon_t \cdot \varepsilon_{t+2} - \theta_1 \varepsilon_t \cdot \varepsilon_{t+1} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_t \cdot \varepsilon_{t+2-2} \\ - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1} \cdot \varepsilon_{t+2} + \theta_1^2 \varepsilon_{t-1} \cdot \varepsilon_{t+1-1} \\ + \theta_1 \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-1} \cdot \varepsilon_{t+2-2} - \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-2} \cdot \varepsilon_{t+2} \\ + \theta_1 \theta_2 \varepsilon_{t-2} \cdot \varepsilon_{t+1-1} + \theta_2^2 \varepsilon_{t-2} \cdot \varepsilon_{t+2-2}]$$

$$= \begin{cases} \sigma_\varepsilon^2 (1 + \theta_1^2 + \theta_2^2) & k=0 \\ -\theta_2 \sigma_\varepsilon^2 & k=2 \end{cases}$$

$$\Rightarrow P(2) = \frac{\gamma_Y(2)}{\gamma_Y(0)} = -\frac{\theta_2}{1 + \theta_1^2 + \theta_2^2}$$

$$\text{Ans: } P_Y(2) = -\frac{0.4}{1 + 0.2^2 + 0.4^2} = -\frac{0.4}{1 + 0.04 + 0.16}$$

$$= -\frac{0.4}{1.53} = -0.262 \approx -0.26$$

T = 50 observations

MA(1) : sans constante

$$Y_t = \varepsilon_t - \theta_1 \varepsilon_{t-1}$$

- Le consultant croit que $\theta > 0.9$.

Vérficat :

On sait que pour un MA(1), la fonction d'autocorrelation d'ordre 1 est :

$$\rho_Y(1) = -\frac{\theta_1}{1+\theta_1^2} = \frac{\sum (Y_t - \bar{Y})(Y_{t+1} - \bar{Y})}{\sum (Y_t - \bar{Y})^2} = 0.93$$

S^o $\theta_1 > 0.9$, alors :

$$-\frac{\theta_1}{1+\theta_1^2} > 0.93$$

~~taux~~ -0.93

Or si : $-\theta_1 = 0.93 + 0.93 \theta_1^2$

$$0.93 \theta_1^2 + \theta_1 - 0.93 = 0$$

$$\Delta = b^2 - 4ac = 1 + 4 \times 0.93 \times 0.93 = 4,4596$$

$$\theta_1 = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{\Delta}}{2a} = \begin{cases} \frac{-1 - \sqrt{4,4596}}{2 \times 0.93} < 0.9 \\ \frac{-1 + \sqrt{4,4596}}{2 \times 0.93} \end{cases}$$

⇒ Réponse faux.

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
